INSPECTING CHURCH PROPERTY TO KEEP IT SAFE

MAINTENANCE OF CHURCH PROPERTY CAN EASILY BE OVERLOOKED. SOMETIMES THIS IS DUE TO A LACK OF HUMAN OR FINANCIAL RESOURCES, SUCH AS WHEN MAINTENANCE IS DEFERRED TO A LATER TIME, WHEN IT IS HOPED THAT MORE FUNDS WILL BE AVAILABLE. BUT IT CAN ALSO HAPPEN JUST BECAUSE STAFF IS SO FAMILIAR WITH THE PROPERTY THEY DO NOT RECOGNIZE SLOWLY-DEVELOPING PROBLEMS OR HAZARDS.

It is important to keep the maintenance up to par at your facilities to avoid injuries to people, damage to your facility and costly insurance claims. Slips and falls, fires and water damage are just three of the bad things that can happen when a church isn't properly maintained. Potholes in the parking lot or disrepair of the sidewalk could lead to someone falling and injuring themselves. Failing to maintain the HVAC or electrical equipment could lead to a devastating church fire. And clogged gutters, blocked drains or deteriorating roofs could lead to water penetrating the church building and causing significant damage.



To avoid these scenarios, make it a priority to establish a regular inspection program for your church building and grounds. Both regular monthly inspections and a more detailed annual inspection are recommended following established checklists. On SafeChurch.com, GuideOne's premier risk management website, sample checklists and other resources are available to help you maintain your facility. In addition to property issues, these extensive checklists also focus on other areas of concern that should receive an annual inspection. Some areas the checklists focus on are: crime, electrical, elevators, emergency preparedness, exits, fire protection, heating, ventilation, air conditioning, housekeeping, insurance, kitchen, playground equipment, slip and fall prevention and water damage. PROTECT AGAINST COPPER THEFT

WORLDWIDE DEMAND FOR COPPER HAS BROUGHT ITS PRICE TO AN ALL-TIME HIGH. UNFORTUNATELY AS A RESULT, COPPER THEFT CRIMES ARE ON THE RISE ACROSS THE NATION.

Thieves commonly target ground- and roof-mounted heating and air conditioning (HVAC) units. However, copper wiring, gutters, pipe and other electrical appliances and products containing copper also are targets.

Because churches of all sizes are falling victim to this crime, it is essential you take steps to prevent copper theft. Consider the following:

- Develop a security plan for your church, which identifies your vulnerabilities.
- Add fences and gates to deny access to property during off times.
- Install security lighting in areas where thieves and other criminals may hide.
- Deny access to your roof-mounted HVAC units by removing ladders.
- Consider using steel cages to enclose AC units.
- Develop a "Church Watch" program to keep an eye on church property.
- Install security cameras to monitor property.
- Use alarms mounted on HVAC units that will sound if any tampering occurs.
